A pediatric resident must lead the project and be significantly involved in proposal development and project activities

You are eligible to apply only if you are graduating from residency in or after June 2012 (for most Categorical Pediatrics Residents this would be PGY-1 and PGY-2 residents only).

Purpose

The CATCH Resident Funds program supports pediatric residents in the planning and/or implementation of innovative, community-based initiatives that increase children’s access to medical homes* or specific health services not otherwise available. Grants of up to \$3,000 are awarded twice each year on a competitive basis for residents to address the needs of children in their communities. These CATCH projects should lead to programs that can be replicated in other communities. Resident CATCH projects must include planning activities or demonstrate completed planning activities, and may include implementation activities.

*What is a medical home? A medical home is not a building, house, or hospital, but rather an approach to providing comprehensive primary care. A medical home is defined as primary care that is accessible, continuous, comprehensive, family centered, coordinated, compassionate, and culturally effective. In a medical home, a pediatric clinician works in partnership with the family/patient to assure that all of the medical and nonmedical needs of the patient are met. Through this partnership, the pediatric clinician can help the family/patient access and coordinate specialty care, educational services, out-of-home care, family support, and other public and private community services that are important to the overall health of the child/youth and family. Eligibility and Selection Criteria

Only pediatric residents from the United States and its territories are eligible to apply

Applications are peer-reviewed by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) District CATCH Facilitators and National Resident CATCH Liaisons (the oversight committee of the CATCH Program), Chapter CATCH Facilitators and District Resident CATCH Liaisons.

Applications must demonstrate the following prerequisites

1. Project is for planning activities or grant proposal demonstrates completed prior planning activities.
2. Project includes plans for broad-based community partnerships.
3. Budget reflects project timeline and activities.
4. Project increases children's access to a medical home or specific health services not otherwise available.
5. Methods for measurement of project goals and objectives described.

Priority will be given to projects that demonstrate the following criteria:

- Project assesses children's medical home status and connects children who previously had none with a medical home.
- Project increases access to needed health services not otherwise available.
- Project predominantly serves a population known to be underserved or with demonstrated health disparities.
- Project assesses children's health insurance status and connects them with available insurance programs.
- Project is feasible and likely to achieve stated goals.
- Community partnerships are broad-based.
- Project is a new initiative within the community.

Use of Grant Funds

CATCH cannot support

- Quality improvement of individual practices or clinics
- Programs for practice or clinic patients only
- Outreach to practice or clinic patients only
- Direct service delivery programs
- Physician or pediatric resident medical training
- Research projects

Unallowable Expenses

- Physicians' or dentists' salaries or fees
- Indirect costs/administrative overhead/fiscal agent fees/fringe benefits
- Supplemental funding to previously awarded grants
- Supplemental funding for existing program activities
- Building or office construction and related activities
- Capital equipment
- Medical equipment or supplies (exception: select supplies for oral health projects)
- Computer hardware and software
- Web site design or construction
- Professional development (educational or training activities)
- Conference registration fees or support
- Educational materials for residents or medical students
- Purchase of cellular telephones
- Health fairs
- Literature reviews
- Speaker fees or speaker travel reimbursement—The AAP Council on Community Pediatrics offers Mentorship and Technical Assistance grants at www.aap.org/sections/socp.

Guidelines for Developing Your Budget

1. Budget must clearly support the goals and timeline outlined in your application.
2. Budget must include a complete description of each activity and expense.
3. All budget line items must include a formula.
4. Do not group multiple activities in one line item.

To avoid the possibility of personal tax liability, it will be necessary for you to appoint a tax-exempt fiscal agent once you receive your award notification. Per federal tax law, individuals are responsible for the taxes on unexpended funds at year-end. Individuals are also responsible for the taxes on expended funds for which an expense report has not been submitted at year-end.

Application Procedures

- Application must be submitted online at www.aap.org/catch/residentgrants.htm
- Attachments to applications
 - Applicants may submit up to four 1-page attachments. For example, minutes or agendas from community meetings; flyers; letters of support, especially from AAP state chapters and current or future community partners
 - Each attachment must include the applicant's full name
 - **Attachments may not be used to respond to or supplement questions contained within the application**

Submission due date

Applications must be submitted by 2:00 pm central time, July 30, 2010. Only online submissions will be accepted. Applicants will be notified in writing of the outcome of their application review by December 31, 2010.

Reporting Procedures

Grant funds will be disbursed in two equal installments. Documentation of expenditures will be required before release of the second installment. A final report will be due 30 days after the 6-month completion date, or extended completion date. Up to two 6-month extensions are allowed. The first installment must be requested by March 31, 2011.

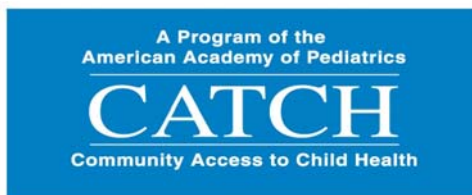
Publicity
